## *Electronic Document Preparation for Self-Represented Litigants*

**E-Pro Se** is a user-friendly, inter-active Web application, developed by the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Missouri, that allows self-represented (pro-se) litigants to prepare court documents and forms electronically. The program gathers necessary information through an on-line exchange with the litigant and then uses the information provided by the user to create documents that may be filed with the district court. All forms are printed legibly in a document format organized to provide the court with essential information about the type of claim the filer intends to present for resolution. Self-represented litigants are able to use E-Pro Se to create documents required for Social Security, employment and civil rights complaints. Training on the use of E-Pro Se is provided by Clerk's Office Staff.

With E-Pro-Se, a litigant can easily create a pleading that meets the Court's requirements by answering a series of automated prompts or questions, reducing the repetitiveness of filling out forms by hand. The program immediately collects and stores the information and data that has been entered, reducing the likelihood of misplaced paperwork.

At the end of each program, the litigant will be able to print documents that are legible and consistent with the format required of attorneys.



### Limitations

Future enhancements may incorporate a digitizing tablet to electronically capture the filer's signature and place it on your document, but currently an ink signature is required. Audio prompts will guide pro-se clients in completing forms, with brief explanations about the law that relates to your documents, and instructions for using the documents prepared with each program. At the present time, completed forms may not be uploaded to the court's electronic case filing system (CM/ECF) from the public access computers in the Clerk's Office or through the Court's external web site. Documents created with E-Pro Se are to be filed with the Court in paper format.



### Getting Started

The E-Pro Se program can be accessed on the Court's website: [www.moed.uscourts.gov](http://www.moed.uscourts.gov) and through the Court's E-Pro Se kiosk in the Self Help Center in the Clerk's Office. Users have the ability to review, edit and save the completed documents that are created. Additional resources are available in the Self Help Center to assist self-represented litigants.
